


Act as a direct pipeline to students who represent the next generation of entrepreneurs, innovators, and leaders.



Canada stands at a crossroads. For decades, our productivity has lagged behind other developed countries, creating an urgent challenge needing to be addressed. Our most powerful solution, however, has been hiding in plain sight: the passion and talent of our diverse communities.

While Canada's population is increasingly racialized, these communities continue to run up against real barriers when trying to fully participate in the economy. We know that when we can help break down those walls, we create a ripple effect. This isn't just about fairness; it's about making our entire country stronger and more competitive. **It's the reason Tribe Network exists.**

Our vision is a world where racialized people are at the forefront of sustainable technology, entrepreneurship and innovation.

Our work is all about building a future where racialized entrepreneurs can truly thrive. We're here to connect our communities to the right resources, knowledge, and networks, helping them turn their bold ideas into businesses that last.

Technology has always been a part of our DNA and 2024 saw that priority grow. We are developing the capacity of our community through technology-based programming and support, helping members capitalize on emerging opportunities. This includes programs like the Tribe Al Launchpad, which launched in March 2025, in partnership with Scale Al, to support startups and SMEs creating applied Al solutions that have the potential to transform value chains.







While Al education and competence is critical for anyone looking to participate in the modern workforce, so is foundational access to even basic technology. We're grateful, thanks to the generosity of the Nova Scotia Education Common Services Bureau, to have been able to distribute 26 refurbished laptops this year, equipping entrepreneurs, students, and community members with the essential tools they need to flourish.

Investing in high-growth Canadian tech startups led by underrepresented founders

To scale our impact, we've got our venture fund. Tribe Ventures: Hidden Gems Fund 1 is a \$30 million early-stage venture fund dedicated to investing in high-growth technology startups led by underrepresented founders across Canada.

By supporting these founders, we are not only enabling their individual success but also collectively influencing the entrepreneurial ecosystem and building a more prosperous and inclusive economy for all of Canada.

This is where homegrown businesses meet world-class support, from initial idea to scaling venture.

Capital support, combined with the power of our network, are fuelling a new generation of businesses. We're working to ensure that every racialized founder has the village they need to thrive, build, and shape a more inclusive economy.

Supporting Racialized Founders Across Atlantic Canada

Our programming is designed to provide targeted support that meets racialized entrepreneurs where they are, giving them the tools, resources, and community they need to succeed.

Supercharging Black Entrepreneurship

The Black Start-Up Project, supported by the Atlantic Canada Opportunities Agency (ACOA), is our flagship initiative to support Black entrepreneurs, providing a comprehensive ecosystem of support. We deliver specialized programs and services to help founders START, BUILD, and

ACCELERATE their businesses.

by providing access to workshops, training, and professional services through The Black Start-Up Project.

Our first cohort of Accelerate Tech (March 2025), an accelerator program, in partnership with Volta, designed to help tech founders gain the skills and insights needed to develop prototypes, secure funding, and scale their ventures.

In 2024, we were able to support 37 projects through the issuance of Consultancy Advisory Services (CAS) grants, directly helping founders address timely business needs.

Big Dreams Start Small with the Start Small Grant powered by Emera

The Start Small Grant, powered by Emera, is a vital program that provides non-repayable funding and support to racialized entrepreneurs and grassroots leaders in Atlantic Canada who are just getting started. It reduces barriers to entry for those with bold ideas but limited access to traditional funding.

Building the Innovation Pipeline

Since 2023, and in collaboration with Saint Mary's University (SMU) and the Province of Nova Scotia, we're proud to have awarded \$150,000 in scholarships to 15 Black and Indigenous students studying in fields like commerce, computer science, and analytics. Associated with this effort, we've also placed 19 students, who we refer to as Tribe Scholars, into 26 unique work placements* within the local innovation ecosystem.

*Over \$265K invested in these placements, made possible through partnerships with organizations like SMU, the Province of NS, the Department of Labour Skills and Immigration, and ICTC

Connecting with African Nova Scotian Youth


In 2024, we rolled out a new initiative focused on building relationships with African Nova Scotian youth. Through a series of visits at high schools across the Halifax Regional Municipality (HRM), we hosted interactive sessions that helped students explore their identity, passions, and purpose. Our sessions used the lkigai framework to help students reflect on their strengths and how those strengths could translate into future career paths, including entrepreneurship.

Solving for a More Sustainable Future

In partnership with HCi3, 2024 was also our first year hosting the Youth Climate Pitch Competition which provided a platform for racialized youth in Nova Scotia to pitch ideas and prototypes that contribute to clean energy solutions. The winners were LDN Records, building a sustainable music studio for community youth in Halifax, and Cavlom Enterprises, developing costeffective, electric auto-rickshaws for Nigeria.

A Hub for Community & Collaboration

Tribe HQ is more than just an office—it's a dynamic coworking space and community hub in the heart of downtown Halifax where every visit can lead to a new connection.

Over the years, our two-story loft, co-occupied with the Land Titles Initiative, has become a go-to gathering place for our community, offering a welcoming environment for racialized founders to work, for partners to hold their meetings, and for community organizations to host their own events.


